An Act of Congress was passed on the 7th of August, 1780, to give the ordinance full effect, and to adapt it to the Constitution of the United States. The ordinance provided for the organization of a government, consisting of executive, legislative and judicial departments. But the governor and judges were empowered to select statute laws of different States, as laws for the territory, until the population would number five thousand, when a legislature should be elected and organized. By an Act of Congress, approved May 7, 1800, all that part of the territory of the United States,...
